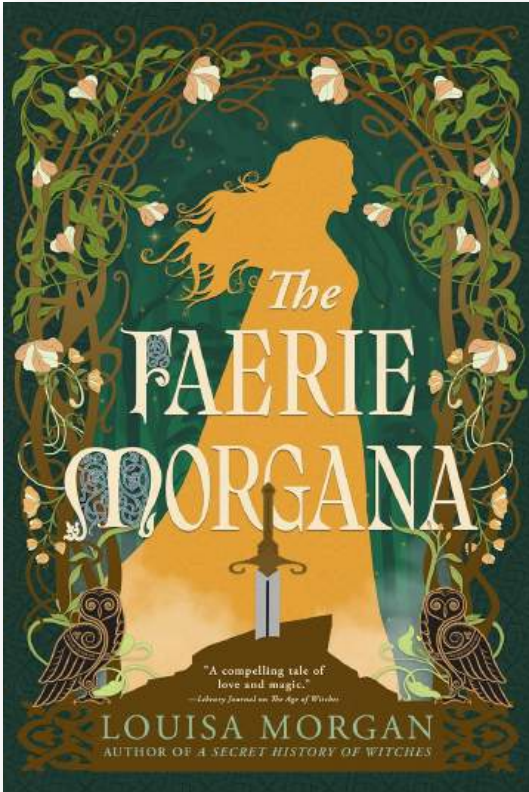

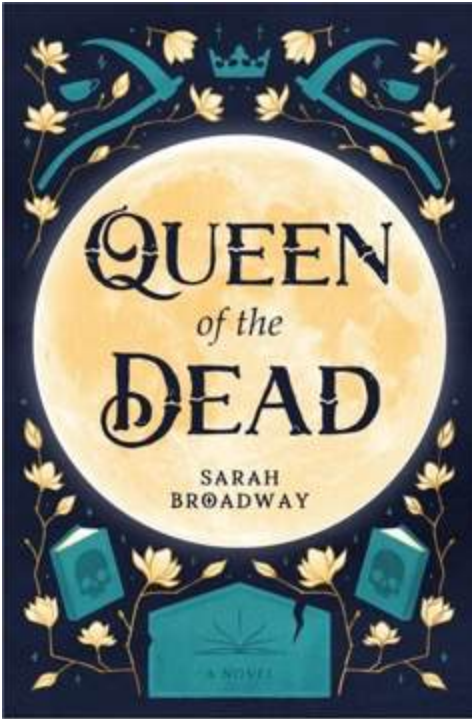

Ben Bova (1932-2020) was the author of more than a hundred works of science fact and fiction, including *Able One*, *Transhuman*, *Orion*, the Star Quest Trilogy, and the Grand Tour novels, including *Titan*, winner of John W. Campbell Memorial Award for best novel of the year. His many honors include the Isaac Asimov Memorial Award in 1996, the Lifetime Achievement Award of the Arthur C. Clarke Foundation in 2005, and the Robert A. Heinlein Award “for his outstanding body of work in the field of literature” in 2008. Dr. Bova was President Emeritus of the National Space Society and a past president of Science Fiction Writers of America, and a former editor of *Analog* and former fiction editor of *Omni*. As an editor, he won science fiction's Hugo Award six times.

Les Johnson is a physicist, author, and NASA technologist. He is an elected member of the International Academy of Astronautics, a Fellow of the British Interplanetary Society and a member of the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America, the National Space Society, and MENSA. Publisher's Weekly noted that “The spirit of Arthur C. Clarke and his contemporaries is alive and well...” when describing Johnson's novel, *Mission to Methone*. His nonfiction book, *A Traveler's Guide to the Stars* (Princeton University Press), was positively reviewed in *Scientific American*, *Wired*, *The Wall Street Journal*, *Analog Science Fiction/Science Fact*, and others. In his day job, Les leads the development of advanced, in-space spacecraft propulsion technologies at the NASA George C. Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Alabama, leading many of NASA's efforts to develop solar sail propulsion for interplanetary and future interstellar travel. During his career at NASA, Les served as the Manager for the Space Science Programs and Projects Office, the In-Space Propulsion Technology Project, and the Interstellar Propulsion Research Project.

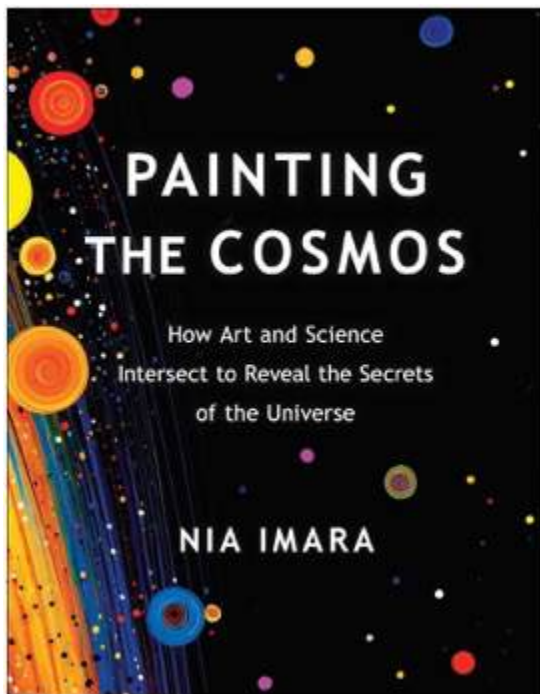

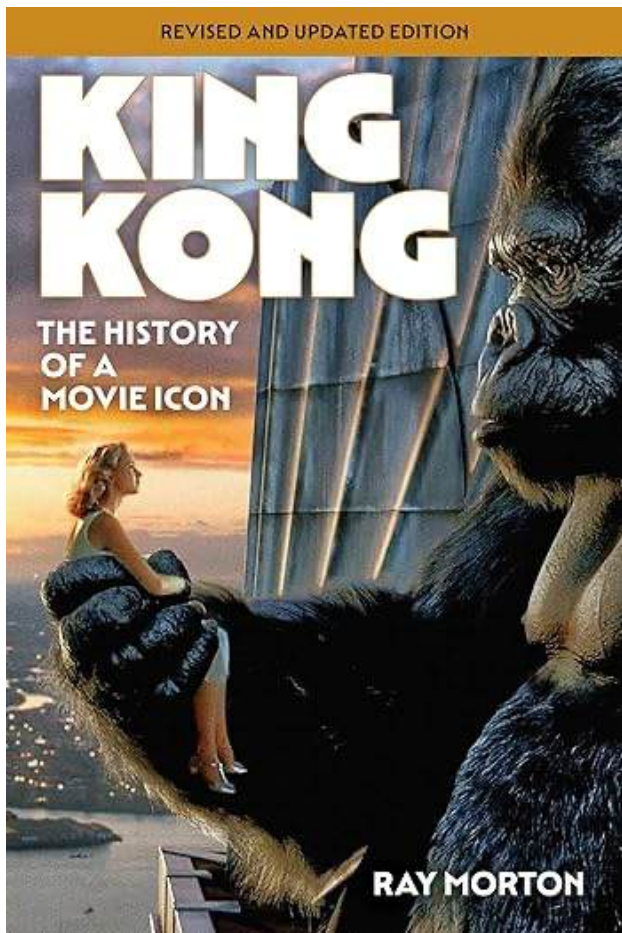

The 2005 book *King Kong: The History of a Movie Icon from Fay Wray to Peter Jackson* covered the six King Kong movies that had been produced up at that time: King Kong (1933), The Son of Kong (1933), King Kong Vs. Godzilla (1962), King Kong Escapes (1967), King Kong (1976), and King Kong Lives (1986), providing in-depth chapters chronicling the conception, production, release, and legacy of each film. The book also contained chapters on other Kong-related projects, as well as a brief preview of Peter Jackson's 2005 King Kong remake, which had not yet opened at the time of the book's publication and so could not be examined in depth.

Since the book's publication, Jackson's film was released and two additional Kong films have been produced: 2017's Kong: Skull Island and 2021's Godzilla Vs. Kong. There has also been a major Broadway musical version of the story, two new animated series, and a number of novels, comic books, and graphic novels. There is also a new film on the way: Godzilla Vs. Kong 2, which is currently slated for release in 2025.

With so much new Kong material to cover and a new Kong film on the way, this expanded and updated version of the book is the most complete, thorough, and comprehensive history of the cinematic King Kong possible.

EYEGASSES have become so commonplace we hardly think about them—unless we can't find them. They're just there, usually immediately at hand. But the 13th century struggles of the controversial Oxford scholar Roger Bacon epitomize even today our efforts to see better. Bacon pioneered the science of using lenses to see, and the struggles of scientists to understand how vision works. And he spent a decade in a miserable medieval prison cell for his hubris, as the church saw it, for advocating that he could "fix" God's creations by improving our eyesight.

Even today, some women in particular take off their glasses before having their picture taken, because we have been taught down the generations that wearing glasses is somehow unattractive. *A FOUR-EYED WORLD*, is about how we see the world and how we have tried to see it. On all the levels that such a simple sentence embraces.

The first two books in a series of novels by the late Antony Swithin (and edited by Mark Sebanc), whose work has been favorably compared to J.R.R. Tolkien and Stephen Donaldson. The books’ covers were designed by Tolkien illustrator Ted Naismith.

The Perilous Quest for Lyonesse is a series designed initially as a twelve-novel sequence with a 15th-century flavor. It is set mainly in Rockall, an imaginary island in the North Atlantic named after a real, but tiny, islet only 20 meters in size off the coast of Scotland. As a result, the series echoes a uniquely conceived Atlantis fable.

Rockall is a world that, in many respects, rivals Tolkien’s Middle-earth in its detailed richness. The first four novels in the series, now out of print, were published in the 1990s by HarperCollins UK, while the others are unpublished manuscripts.

Series editor Mark Sebanc corresponded with Swithin before his death and has a vivid sense of the brilliance and magnitude of Swithin’s achievement and what he was striving for – which is one reason Swithin’s estate commissioned Sebanc to edit and rewrite the original manuscript. Swithin deliberately draws on the Atlantis myths, and the Rockall of the real world is the remaining stump of a continent that sank beneath the waves leaving behind a tip exposed.



Antony Swithin was the pen name of William Antony Swithin Sarjeant, a world-renowned professor of geology at the University of Saskatchewan who died of cancer in 2002.

Marc Sebanc’s doctoral dissertation on Tolkien is considered a major contribution to Tolkien scholarship. He is also the co-author of two novels (with James Anderson) from Baen books in the Stone Harp series.

Jazz on American Culture

From his upbringing as a “red-diaper baby” among some of the leading lights of American music and Left politics, to his legendary work as bassist for the Bill Evans trio, to his collaborations with such figures as Charles Mingus, and Billie Holiday, Chuck Israels has witnessed over a half-century of change and innovation in American jazz music. In *Bass Notes*, he offers up both an engaging memoir and a meditation on the history of jazz music and its prospects for the future. In addition to fascinating stories from his work with musicians like John Coltrane, Joan Baez, and Herbie Hancock, he gives an inside view into the mysterious alchemy that happens when skilled jazz improvisers get together. As he explains, the combination of disciplined collaboration and individual freedom is not just exhilarating for musicians but an inspiring reflection of, and model for, democracy and the potential for true racial equality.

Israels recounts his decision to leave Bill Evans’s trio to deepen his musical education and develop as a composer—and his choice not to rejoin the trio in Evans’s last years. Citing such developments as the dominance of conservatory training and ill-advised crossover attempts with classical and pop, he also gives a passionate but unsentimental account of how jazz lost its importance in the pantheon of American music, even though it is America’s most distinctive contribution to world music. He explores the obstacles that today’s best young jazz musicians face following the giants of earlier generations and the dwindling opportunities to make a living as a musician. But despite it all, Israels argues that jazz’s enduring and rich legacy will not be lost and shows how it can be not just sustained but broadened in the years to come.

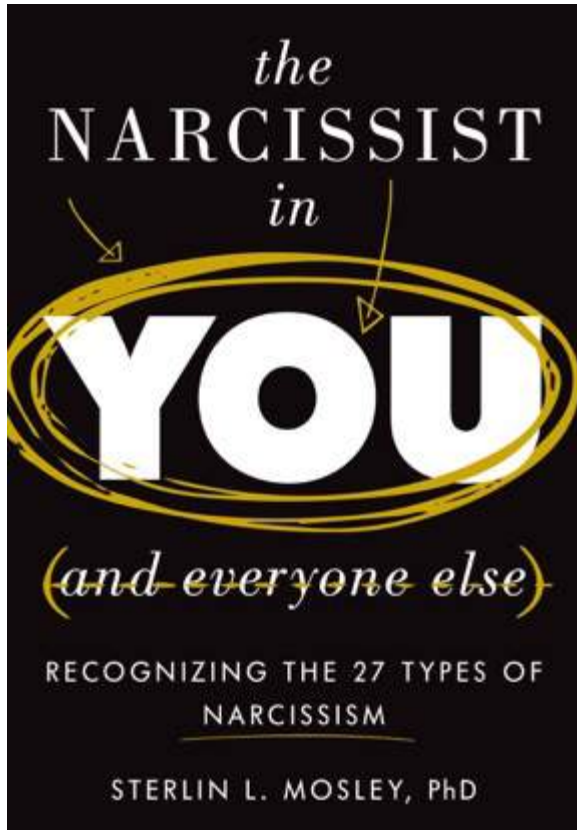

As he worked, Johnson would discover that his beloved grandfather had participated in the Massacre. The discovery shook him to his core. Determined to find some way to acknowledge and reconcile this terrible truth, Chester would eventually meet Sheila L. Walker, a descendant of African-American victims of the Massacre. She herself had also been on her own migration in

family history that led straight to the Elaine Race Massacre. Together, she and Johnson committed themselves to a journey of racial reconciliation and abiding friendship.

Damaged Heritage brings to light a deliberately erased chapter in American history, and Chester offers a blueprint for how our pluralistic society can finally acknowledge—and deal with— damaged heritage and follow a path to true healing.

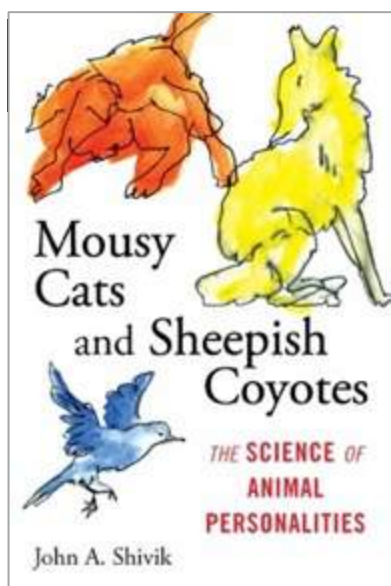

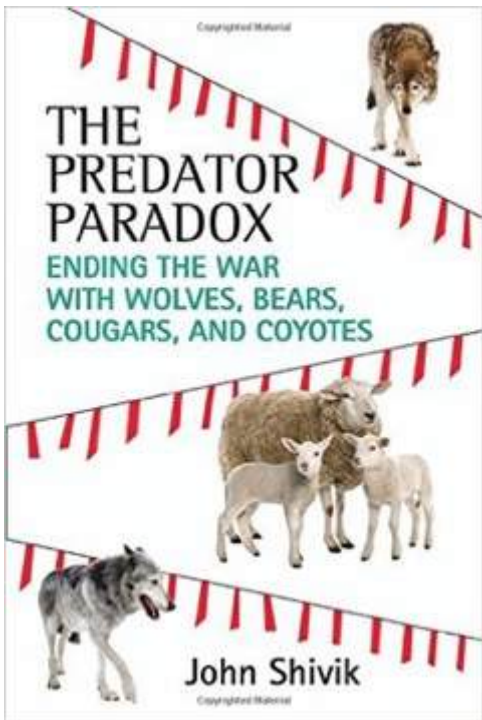

Stories of backyard bears and cat-eating coyotes are becoming increasingly common—even for people living in non-rural areas. Farmers anxious to protect their sheep from wolves aren’t the only ones concerned: suburbanites and city dwellers are also having more unwanted run-ins with mammalian predators.

And that might not be a bad thing. After all, our government has been at war with wildlife since 1914, and the death toll has been tremendous: federal agents kill a combined ninety thousand wolves, bears, coyotes, and cougars every year, often with dubious biological effectiveness. Only recently have these species begun to recover. Given improved scientific understanding and methods, can we continue to slow the slaughter and allow populations of mammalian predators to resume their positions as keystone species?

As carnivore populations increase, however, their proximity to people, pets, and livestock leads to more conflict, and we are once again left to negotiate the uneasy terrain between elimination and conservation. In *The Predator Paradox*, veteran wildlife management expert John Shivik argues that we can end the war while still preserving and protecting these key species as fundamental components of healthy ecosystems. By reducing almost sole

reliance on broad-scale “death from above” tactics and incorporating nonlethal approaches to managing wildlife—from electrified flagging to motion-sensor lights—we can dismantle the paradox, have both people and predators on the landscape, and ensure the long-term survival of both.

As the boundary between human and animal habitats blurs, preventing human-wildlife conflict depends as much on changing animal behavior as on changing our own perceptions, attitudes, and actions. To that end, Shivik focuses on the facts, mollifies fears, and presents a variety of tools and tactics for consideration.

Blending the science of the wild with entertaining and dramatic storytelling, Shivik’s clear-eyed pragmatism allows him to appeal to both sides of the debate while arguing for the possibility of coexistence: between ranchers and environmentalists, wildlife managers and animal-welfare activists, and humans and animals.

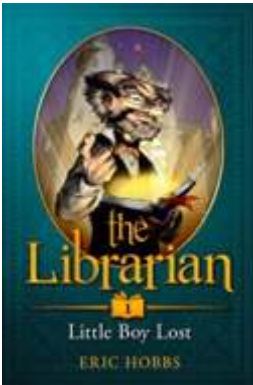

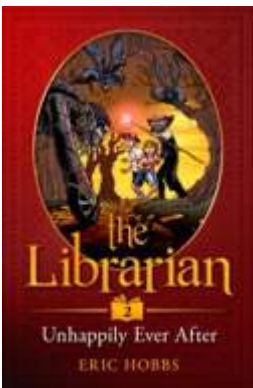

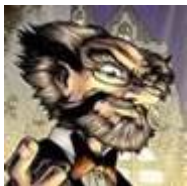

But lurking in the background, there are clues to suggest a darker adversary is at large who could prove to be an even bigger challenge as Wesley finally moves forward with the old man as the Librarian's Apprentice.

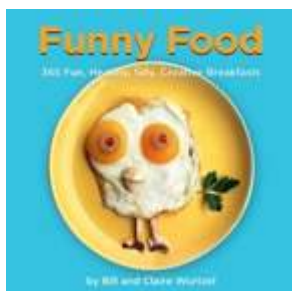

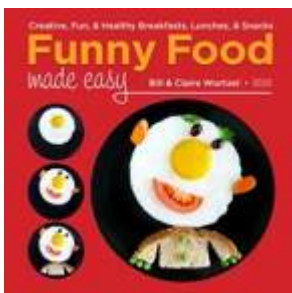

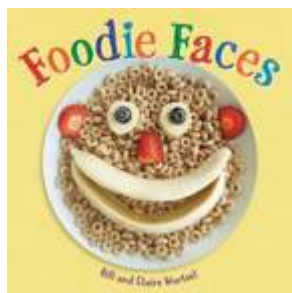
